Welcome to MA Prosthetic Effects,

We're getting in touch with some important information about your course that will help you as you prepare to join us.

At the end of this letter, you will find a list of equipment that you should bring with you, as well as any other costs that you might incur throughout your course that are not covered by your student loan.

We've also included some suggested reading. You will have access to all the reading resources from the library when you arrive on campus, but if you're looking forward to getting stuck in, this is a good place to start.

Your academic experience will be predominantly in person with some courses using some digital resources to support your learning. To engage in the digital learning activity, although you will be able to access IT suites on campus, you may find it beneficial to have a laptop to access the platforms and tools we use. You will be provided with free access to the Microsoft Office suite, (including Word, Excel and PowerPoint) while you study at Falmouth.

If you are eligible for a loan from Student Finance and have not yet applied, please do so immediately to ensure the loan is approved before you enrol. Once you enrol you are liable for the tuition fees. Please note that we offer guidance to students, but teaching is heavily reliant on your presence in the studio and your active engagement in research and creative practice. To help you with your postgrad development, we centre our teaching around project consultation and directed practice and not practicing basic skills in the classroom. You will be given video resources and texts to find out more about any practical skills and materials you may need to develop your own specialism rather than have lectures and demonstrations on a wide range of basics.

Watching, reading, drawing, making

From now on, you should try to get acquainted with as many contemporary films, TV series and other outlets for prosthetics (as safely) as you can. Be curious, investigate processes, question whether they are digital or real? Immerse yourself in this exciting world. And read books, not only the ones we recommend, but others that fire your imagination. Draw inspiration from these texts, fire up your creativity in advance of joining us! And above all, keep drawing, sketching, planning ideas and making things.

For your academic preparation, try to read some of the books on our reading list below and extend your reading to publications such as *Prosthetics* (magazine) to understand how the industry is discussed outside of the educational sphere.

Materials and equipment costs

A laptop will be an essential piece of equipment along with a reliable broadband connection. Many of our students make use of Macs but we don't have a preference on the course. You may prefer to work digitally with a graphics tablet, and our studios fully support the Wacom range. If that's the case, we recommend that you get yourself a Wacom tablet before you arrive.

Some material costs that you are likely to incur for mould making, sculpting and so on will be covered in your fees. However, in your major projects you will negotiate the brief you set yourself with your tutors. It may be that your proposal calls for materials over those covered by the course.

We provide students with a materials budget of up to £250 for the first term and a further £250 in the second term, to be used to purchase materials from suppliers for the projects. Typically students will spend in the region of £200 to £300, possibly more, of their own money depending on the complexity of their final major project which they will fund themselves.
